

PFT COVID Update 7-13-22: BA.5 Variant Emerges - Booster Now or Later - Sobering Statistics - Links

CORONA VIRUS Updates

BA.5 Variant Emerges As Current Dominant Strain of COVID-19.

Covid-19 Omicron variant BA.5 now accounts for approximately 65% of all new cases in the United States, according to a recent article from NPR. Cases are on the rise nationwide, as are reinfections and hospitalizations.

This variant is extremely communicable — likely the most we’ve seen to date — however with a population approaching 80 percent with at least one dose of vaccine and 68 percent fully vaccinated, our general reaction has been better on the whole.

While people are again contracting Covid-19 in increased numbers (*including a sizable number of reinfections*), less people are suffering the full brunt of the virus on account of a stronger overall immuno-response across our total population. The unvaccinated remain at a higher risk for hospitalization and severe consequences.

The variants that are emerging now are not more deadly, however they are becoming more “*immuno-evasive*” — learning to navigate around the protection provided by previous infection, vaccination or both.

Keeping up to date with scheduled boosters, as well as using common sense mitigation, masking and distancing when in crowded, indoor environments or around at-risk populations are still proactive steps you can take to reduce your risk of contracting or spreading COVID-19.

To Booster Or Not To Booster: That Is The Question.

While vaccine makers push forward toward creating updated vaccinations that include specific responsiveness to emerging Omicron variants (*called "bivalent shots" that combine original vaccine with Omicron protection*), there's still work to be done in increasing the number of people who choose a first or even second booster shot.

The question is — should you seek out your scheduled booster now, or try to “*wait it out*” for Omicron-specific boosters targeted for availability in the fall

The answer is no — don't wait. If you are eligible for one of the boosters now (*or soon*), then get one now — and anticipate POTENTIALLY needing another booster in the late fall or early winter.

“Only about half of vaccinated Americans have gotten a single booster. And while a second booster that's recommended for people 50 and older again restores protection, only a quarter of those eligible have gotten one.” -- NPR

Sobering Statistics And Their Ramifications.

In an 18-month period between 2020 and 2021, **one out of every eight deaths in the United States was a COVID related death.**

It's the kind of statistic you read and have trouble conceptualizing — however the statistics are only part of the story.
